The DLPOA board has been working on many projects to help support the neighborhood, but I feel that our three main goals are to **protect**, **preserve**, and **enhance** the value of our community.

Our Plans and Outlook

I think first and foremost, we must protect our lake. We are in the process of testing water and discovering run-off areas that could be contaminating our lake. Many thanks to Ed Cesa for spear-heading this monumental and ongoing project. This is an ongoing project, and one which our greenbelt committee has prioritized. Ed has also maintained the locks on all the beach gates, organized the addition of the electrical outlet at the main beach and arranged for the purchase of the new rafts coming this summer.

We are adopting 200 trees for planting on the west side of the lake. Please contact Scott Oswald for details if you would like to adopt and care for a tree. Thank you, Scott, for the many hours you have devoted to the refurbishing process of the west side of the greenbelt. Last year's seed planting didn't generate the growth we had anticipated, but we will not, and cannot give up!

Thank you to Wes Watt for working a multitude of projects. Wes manages tree services, building signs, moving boats, and concerts. He maintains a surveillance camera and is always available to meet with contractors (lawn maintenance and sanitation) and to take deliveries for us at the lake.

The Instinctive Drowning Response

This response, so named by Francesco A. Pia, Ph.D., is what people do to avoid actual or perceived suffocation in the water. And it does not look like most people expect. There is very little splashing, no waving, and no yelling or calls for help of any kind. To get an idea of just how quiet and undramatic from the surface drowning can be, consider this: It is the number two cause of accidental death in children, aged 15 and under (just behind vehicle accidents.) Of the approximately, 750 children who will drown next year, about 375 of them will do so within 25 yards of a parent or other adult. In 10 percent of those drownings, the adult will actually watch them do it, having no idea it is happening (source: CDC). Drowning does not look like drowning. Dr. Pia in an article in the Coast Guard's On Scene *Magazine*, described the instinctive drowning response like this:

- 1. Except in rare circumstances, drowning people are physiologically unable to call out for help. The respiratory system was designed for breathing. Speech is the secondary or overlaid function. Breathing must be fulfilled before speech occurs.
- 2. Drowning people's mouths alternately sink below and reappear above the surface of the water. The mouths of drowning people are not above the surface of the water long enough for them to exhale,

inhale, and call out for help. When the drowning people's mouths are above the surface, they exhale and inhale quickly as their mouths start to sink below the surface of the water.

- 3. Drowning people cannot wave out of the water to breathe.
- 4. Throughout the Instinctive people cannot voluntarily
- before submersion occurs.

Thanks to Terry Gannon for sharing this important information. Let's all keep an eye out for each other during the summer months with our activities in the water.

for help. Nature instinctively forces them to extend their arms laterally and press down on the water's surface. Pressing down on the surface of the water, permits drowning people to leverage their bodies so they can lift their mouths

Drowning Response, drowning control their arm movements. Physiologically, drowning people who are struggling on the surface of the water cannot stop drowning and perform voluntary movements such as waving for help, moving toward a rescuer, or reaching out for a piece of rescue equipment.

5. From beginning to end of the Instinctive Drowning Response people's bodies remain upright in the water, with no evidence of a supporting kick. Unless rescued by a trained lifeguard, these drowning people can only struggle on the surface of the water from 20 to 60 seconds

LOON-ATICS OF DUNHAM LAKE

What is this rich yodeling call you hear on Dunham Lake in April and May? The sound is so haunting, it makes you wonder if you have been transported into the U.P. of Michigan. You are NOT going "loony." It is the common loon, which often stop at our lake on their way to summer nesting sites in Northern Michigan and Canada. Dunham Lake offers solitude (no motorboats) and clear water so they can see and catch fish.

The common loon is a migratory diving bird that is known for its haunting calls. Both male and female have black heads that appear almost iridescent, long dark pointed bills, white necklaces around the black necks and white spots on a dark black back and sides. The loon has a white breast and belly with dark, webbed feet. Their eyes are red to better see fish when diving.

Fun Facts

- 1. Loons have four unique calls, but the one you will hear on our lake at dusk is the wail. The call can be heard for miles and is their way of communicating to each other... Where are you?
- 2. Their bones are not hollow. It can take up to a third of a mile to get airborne, splashing their wings and feet on the surface.
- 3. The oldest nesting pair of loons, at 33 years of age and counting, has been documented in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

We had reached out to our residents in an earlier mailing, in response to results we received from our most recent water quality study of Dunham Lake, and are asking for your continued attention to these findings as we head into the spring/ summer growing season.

Recent studies comparing results in 2009 to those of 2018, are showing a degradation of oxygen levels in our lake. This effects the depth at which cold water fish species can exist and also affects the amount of algae on the water's surface. The study shows a narrowing depth due to the dissolved oxygen level-and we are seeing that Dunham Lake cannot support the quantity of fish it used to. Additionally, we are seeing an increase in algae at the top of the lake. This decrease in oxygen is occurring because of an internal loading of nutrients (increased levels of both nitrogen and phosphorus in the water). It is important to understand that even with this degradation, our lake still remains one of the cleanest in lower southeastern Michigan. This important new data tells us a lot about what we all need to do to keep our lake thriving and support the fish quantity as well as a clean surface for our swimmers.

Because we do not know all the sources that contribute to these increased nutrient levels, the board is currently working with professionals to develop a plan to identify them. In the meantime, we have been advised to also educate homeowners (our residents) on steps we can all take to control our contribution of nitrogen and phosphorus into the ground water.

ATTENTION RESIDENTS

HELP SAVE THE FISH WITH CLEAN WATER

Here are a few steps we can all do to help:

Consider not applying (or at least limiting) fertilizers, weed killers, and other chemical treatments with nitrogen and phosphorus to your lawn. Ask your lawn treatment company to test your soil before applying treatments to ensure only the necessary amounts are applied.

2 Take any unused medications to your local police station for disposal. Do not flush them down the toilet so they do not end up in the water supply.

3 Have your septic system pumped out periodically and check to see your tank/field is in good working order.

4 Make sure driveway culverts are open and ditches are clear enough so that water can flow freely into areas designed to absorb nutrients before getting to the lake. Contact the county drain commission if your water isn't flowing. Typically, they will come out and assist with a blockage, as these lie on their right-of-way.

The History of Dunham Lake

A TIMELINE: EARLY DAYS FROM THE MINUTES – BY Carolyn Richards

The very first meeting of the Dunham Lake Property Owners' Association (DLPOA) took place in 1958 with the development company's encouragement. Minutes from early meetings reveal that some problems are timeless: controlling access to the lake and parks, keys, guest tags, vandalism, teenage parties and beer, pets, boat storage, and maintenance are some.

The following is a coronological overview of some of the accomplishments and decisions that have helped protect and improve our park and subdivision in past years.

The Dunham Laker newsletter masthead has seen many variations over the years as well as many editors dedicated to working on it. Until our website, the newsletter was one of the best ways to keep up with the news in our community. Being the latest editor, I was excited to introduce the first full-color newsletter in the Spring/Summer issue of 2019!

1958

- Dues \$20.00
- Adopted the bylaws
- Boats must be marked with property owners' lot numbers
- Acreage of northeast lakeshore has been subdivided into Dunham Heights. Meetings will be held on occasion with that subdivision

1960

- Dues \$15.00
- Cooperate with conservation department to survey fish
- Keys to gates available
- Trash cans suggested

1961

- Asked development company to provide sanitary facility at picnic area
- Agreed to screen dam to keep fish in the lake

1962

- Keys to new outhouses available at sales house. (the cement slab is still there behind the park bench, just west of the main park.)
- Considered \$400 fish study

1963

- Purchased picnic tables and water slide, installed dock
- Development company orders:
- no motors allowed on Dunham Lake; future Livingston subdivisions will have the same restrictions. except for a 200 square-foot larger house size; soon a new beach will be made on the Livingston County side.
- Voted against connecting Addaleen Road in Dunham Heights to Blue Heron Drive, so that the subdivisions would remain separate
- Decide no brush burning allowed must take brush to the gravel pit for burning

1965

• Voted to accept property owners in Livingston County's Dunham Lake subdivisions into the DLPOA

April 20,1987

1967

• Much discussion over concern that the Civic Committee owns the parkland (park is tax free.) Prefer it to be turned over to the DLPOA

1968

- Road oiling discussed—DLPOA collects money for road oiling
- Trees sprayed for bugs in beach and picnic areas

1969

 Voted not to spray park with DDT again because of new evidence of its effect on wildlife

FEATURE STORY

1970

- Gate put up at West Beach
- Each lot owner owns 1/396th of the park and pays taxes on it (due to change in Michigan tax law)

1971

- Fence along west side of lake had been pulled out
- Fence on Briarhill with a walk-in gate will be installed

1972

- Light approved for picnic and beach areas
- Committee established to improve fishing, and a limnology study of the lake was conducted by resident committee

1973

- Dues \$25.00
- Lake stocked with fish
- Perennial discussion of oil vs. chloride on roads
- \$10.00 of dues collected to go towards road oiling
- Purchased pump to water sod on West Beach until it takes hold
- Outhouses removed and portable toilets brought in

1975

- Volunteers to patrol park on weekends—must wear tags
- Oakland County received speed limit signs at last! Livingstion County not densely populated enough for speed limit signs yet
- Had park perimeter walk and sent letters to encroachers

1976

 Group working to get power boat ordinance approved by state

1978

1977

1980

• Getting safe road oil a problem— DNR says oil must have no contaminants

1982

- At last, roads in both counties will be paved this summer!
- Historical committee began its study

1983

- Liens placed by Civic Committee on lot owners not paying dues • Gypsy moth committee formed

1984

- Dues \$40.00 • Decided to name picnic area after (Pat) Van Wagoner

1985 • Dues \$50.00

- Water quality survey done by Wally Fusiler—lake is clean due to greenbelt—need another study in five years
- Hired Sacky Security
- Tags for cars

1987

- Dues \$55.00
- Livingston County
- New policy of removing boats by November 15 until ice-out in spring



• Dues increase to \$35.00 partly because of Donohoe lawsuit

• Speed limit signs installed on Livingston County side

• Will cap the well in the picnic area

- Completion of greenbelt survey in
- Became members of the Michigan Lakes and Stream Association



• Dunham Laker published by the board-historical articles began

1988

• Night lock program instituted: special locks put on gates at 10 p.m. and removed at 7 a.m.

1989

- Greenbelt survey completed

DLPOA PROPERTY, PARK, AND LAKE REGULATIONS



The following regulations are designed to assure members and their guests of the maximum benefits of the association facilities. Strict observance of these rules is necessary for the accomplishment of this purpose. Any member violating any of these rules or engaging in conduct that is not in the best interest of the association members will subject himself to such action as the Civic Committee and Property Owners Association deem advisable.

- 1 Park property (trees, brush, equipment, etc.) must not be destroyed or removed without the permission of the Property Owners Association and the Civic Committee. Violators will be subject to treble damages.
- 2 The use of water from Dunham Lake for private water systems is prohibited.
- 3 Members shall be personally liable for any damages to association property resulting from careless, willful, or negligent acts by their families or their quests.
- 4 Glass containers are not allowed on beaches. All refuse in the park areas must be deposited in the trash containers supplied for that purpose. The dumpster is for park trash only.
- 5 Entrance gates to the association parks must be kept locked at all times.
- 6 Minors must have proper adult supervision when using association property.
- 7 Parents shall be held responsible for minors' actions when using association property and facilities.
- 8 Boat docking on the beaches or swimming rafts is not permitted.
- 9 Picnics are not allowed on the swimming beaches.
- 10 There shall be no open fires for any purpose on the DLPOA common grounds, excluding approved charcoal and gas grills. Exceptions to this rule include family camp outs, pig roast, and the haunted trail, all of which are board-sanctioned events with an approved container provided.
- 11 Overnight camping is not permitted in the park areas or on any subdivision lots.
- 12 All state fish and fire hazard laws are to be observed.
- 13 Boats must be identified with a DLPOA boat sticker to permit easy identification. All boats shall be completely removed from the water when not in use.

- 14 No private docks or rafts are permitted along DLPOA property.
- 15 No motors (gas or electric) are allowed on Dunham Lake.
- 16 No motorized vehicles of any kind are allowed on lake or park areas. This includes minibikes, motorcycles, snowmobiles, and all-terrain vehicles.
- 17 The use of firearms, air rifles, or weapons of any description is prohibited at all times in the subdivision and park areas.
- 18 No dogs are allowed on the beach areas due to sanitary and safety reasons. All dogs in the main park area must be restrained by a leash.
- 19 Swimming, picnicking, or congregating is not permitted after 10:00 pm.
- 20 No horses are allowed in the park or beach areas due to sanitary and safety reasons.
- 21 No guest will be admitted to the park and lake areas unless the lot owner host is physically present in the subdivision. Guests at the park who are 18 years old or younger must be physically accompanied by their DLPOA resident host at all times while in the park.
- 22 The number of guests shall be limited to 10, except upon approval by Park Reservations of the Association.
- 23 All privately owned boats and apparatus associated with those boats must be removed from the park area by December 1 and are allowed back on the greenbelt April 1.
- 24 Each property owner is limited to 2 parking places in the parking lots.
- 25 Smoking is prohibited on the beaches, and all residents are required to properly dispose of cigarette butts.
- 26 If members and or quests violate any of these rules, they will be asked to vacate the DLPOA property.

TO MAKE PARK RESERVATIONS call Diane Blakeney at 248-408-7012

The DLPOA Board has set rules that are intended to allow residents the use of the park for gatherings, but not to infringe on the rights of other residents using the parklands. The DLPOA is asking each gathering sponsor to support the spirit of these rules and ensure their enforcement. In April, 2017, the DLPOA Board approved a park reservation rate increase effective June 1, 2017. Rates will be raised to \$20 per reservation and \$20 refundable deposit for parties of 10-30 people. For parties of more than 30 people, the rate will now be \$40 per reservation with a refundable \$40 deposit.

Your deposit will either be refunded or shredded, depending on whether or not the rules have been followed. The fees will go for the cleaning of the porta-potties and general park cleaning.

Main Park Dumpster

The dumpster at the main park is for park trash only, it is not intended for household use. Please use the metal can located next to dumpster for ashes from charcoal grilles. Do not empty hot coals into the dumpster.

DLPOA KEY POLICY

- Only two keys will be issued per property owner.
- Replacement keys will be \$75.00 each.
- Property owner must sign for any keys issued to them.
- All dues must be paid prior to keys being issued.
- Property owner agrees to retain possession of issued keys.
- If there is a transfer of property, the seller agrees to turn the keys over to the buyer.

DLPOA PARK RESERVATION RULES AND PICNIC ETIQUETTE

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DLPOA RULES are as follows:

- A scheduled party will have access to 3 picnic tables.
- The party is restricted to the sponsor's parking space plus the two additional passes provided with the reservation.
- No tents or tarps are allowed.
- Each gathering is responsible for emptying the garbage cans in the area into the dumpster. Please replace garbage bags into empty cans.
- Each gathering is responsible to thoroughly police the area for trash.
- Each gathering is responsible for the safe disposal of burning charcoal. Please allow yourself enough time to cool the coals. DO NOT LEAVE BURNING COALS IN THE GRILLS. We have had fires in the dumpster, so please follow this rule for safety purposes.
- Party cleanup should begin with enough time to ensure your party is completed and complete by 8 p.m.
- 8 Glass bottles are not allowed on beaches.
- **9** As the sponsor of the party, you are responsible for the behavior of your guests. If you require assistance, there may be park security on duty or you may call 911 for the police. Please be courteous and responsive to the security people. They are there to help and do their job to enforce rules.
- **10** Please contain the noise of your group: have fun but be aware of your neighbors who border the park area.
- 11 Do not park on the surrounding streets near the park. You may receive a parking ticket.
- 12 Please keep GATES LOCKED AT ALL TIMES.
- 13 It is possible to have more than one party booked on the same day. Please be considerate to all who are visiting.
- 14 If you are going to reserve tables with signs or tablecloths prior to the start of your party it is recommended that someone from the party be present in the park. The DLPOA will not be involved in settling disputes on reserved picnic tables.
- 15 Please do not dominate the volleyball, basketball, and playground areas as well as open spaces of the park.
- 16 PLEASE clean up cigarette butts and SMOKING is prohibited on beaches.
- 17 Please ensure that the woods are not used in place of the porta-potty.

DLPOA PROPERTY, PARK, AND LAKE BOAT REGULATIONS

Please review the following regulations that have been adopted by the DLPOA Board. Failure to comply with these regulations could lead to removal of your boat from the greenbelt until the appropriate fine is paid.



Boat Regulations

- By Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) statute, boats operated on Dunham Lake are to be NON-motorized. No motors, gas or electric, are allowed.
- Boat docking on the beaches and swimming rafts is not permitted.
- All boats stored on DLPOA lakeshore **MUST** have a **DLPOA BOAT REGISTRATION sticker** to permit easy identification. (If your sticker cannot be seen when the boat is stowed, use a permanent marker to write your sticker number on a visible part of the boat or boat cover.) Contact Cinda Everhart at 248-889-4419 to obtain your sticker.



- All boats shall be **COMPLETELY REMOVED** from the water when not in use.
- All privately owned boats and apparatus associated with those boats must be removed from the park area by December 1 and are allowed back on the greenbelt April 1. Boats left on the lakeshore after December 1 will be relocated and restrained at the main park at the expense of the owner.

Boat Stowing Courtesies

To all who store their boats down at the lakeshore — please be aware of the "NO BOATS" posted areas. There are 4x4 sign posts indicating where boats may **NOT** be kept due to ecologically sensitive areas. Boats



found in these areas may be relocated by the board and held at the main park at your expense.

- DO NOT place a tarp under the boat, as it kills off the natural vegetation.
- No part of a stowed boat may be on the walking path.
- No part of a stowed boat shall hang above the water line.
- If a boat is leaned against a tree, that tree shall be mature and strong enough to support the boat without damage to the tree.
- If a boat is leaned against a tree, the shortest side of the boat shall be upward.
- Water should be removed from each stowed boat on a weekly basis to minimize the breeding of mosquitoes.
- The choice of a location for boat stowage should, as much as possible, preserve the natural view of our beautiful lake.

We are lucky to keep our boats on the greenbelt. Please be sure to follow the rules of our lake!

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Extreme Demand Continues to Out-Muscle Supply Shortages

Extreme buyer demand continues to put pressure on Southeast Michigan inventory levels, which are down 61% compared to last year. Despite depleted inventories, closed sales and weekly showing activity are up, values are rising, and market times are dropping.

The average sale price is 98.5% of asking, and over half of sales are at or above full list price—both higher than any time since 2015. Market times continue to shrink—lower than any time since 2015. Year-To-Date (YTD) average market times are down to 42 days, and 43% of listings show up as pending within 10 days.

Inventory shortages, especially in the entry and middle price ranges, continue to fuel buyer competition and multiple offers that drive up values. Typically, price per square foot declines during the 4th quarter, as inventory gets picked over and demand drops off. Year-Over-Year average price per square foot was up 15% in February!

Expect demand to remain high and supply levels to remain low through 2021. Prices will continue to rise.

Anyone thinking about moving in the next year or two may want to jump in early to take advantage of lower interest rates and prices. Buying sooner will also lock in property assessments with lower caps.

These advantages benefit both buyers and sellers.
